

As the museum rolls ahead into its 21st year running trains in Parrish, we'd like to re-cap the highlights of 2012:

- Carried a total of 30,923 ticketed passengers.
- Converted Union Pacific baggage car #6324 into a 100 seat open-air coach. See article below.
- Built a replica Seaboard Air Line Railroad station in Willow using original blueprints.
- Acquired a Seaboard Air Line caboose from Kissimmee. See article below.

Kissimmee Caboose



The City of Kissimmee, FL donated an ex-SAL caboose to the museum in late 2012. Its' immediately former life was that of an ice cream and drink stand in a city park meaning the railroad interior is long gone. The caboose was originally built in 1952 by the International Car Company for the Seaboard Air Line Railroad. After the Seaboard and Atlantic Coast Line merged in 1967, the caboose was rebuilt similar to ACL's M-5 specifications and called an M-6 caboose.

The Mulberry Phosphate Museum has a sister M-6 caboose with the original interior. Paul Chapman and several other volunteers have gutted all the ice cream parlor "enhancements" and we now have a solid caboose shell. Once funding for a new floor and interior can be secured, this caboose will be restored to M-6 specs and returned to

charter service as the museum's first southern railroad caboose.

Union Pacific Baggage Car Conversion



Pictured here are before and after photos of Union Pacific baggage car #6324. The completed car operated for the first time on the North Pole Express, adding 100 seats to the North Pole every night. Even with the extra seats and additional nights, the event was still a complete sell-out!

The history of the car is long and varied. Built in March 1961 for the Union Pacific, the car's life with UP was cut short following the creation of Amtrak in 1971. Union Pacific sold the car to Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey Circus in 1972 where it became a stock car for elephants until 1999. Over a decade after being stored out-of-service, the car

came to the museum via an anonymous donor in 2012.

In additional to lighting, sound system and electrical outlets, the car also features two restrooms which doubles the sanitation capacity on the train. A second baggage car, UP #6330, was also donated and is a candidate for future conversion one funding and manpower can be identified.
